This summer, I will take my last elective, *Hope and Despair*. This class explores how people have hope in the midst of the most challenging times in their lives, and how Christian public leaders can instill hope in all people through the Scriptures.

Meanwhile, I continue to help create worship experiences as a chapel staff member at Luther and at my church in NE Minneapolis, Grace Lutheran. I also welcome people to Luther Seminary's campus as the Welcome Coordinator and help plan discernment retreats.
